STATEMENT OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND OBJECTIVES ON RESEARCH, TEACHING, AND SERVICE / OUTREACH

Personal Statement - I have 37 years of faculty experience in applied health policy, outcomes assessment, health professions and public health education, health workforce development and translational research that qualify me to conduct, analyze, publish and disseminate research; use these to inform the public, health providers and policymakers at the local, state and federal levels; and engage individuals and communities to develop and implement programs and initiatives to address unmet health needs in rural and urban underserved areas and populations.

As Associate Vice President since 2018, I lead Rural Health Workforce Development Initiatives at the University of Arizona (U of A) Health Sciences (UAHS), including Interprofessional Education (IPE) across its six UAHS Colleges in Tucson and Phoenix, in community-based settings, and online. Tucson campus IPE takes place in the 220,000 sq. ft., Health Sciences Innovation Building on the seventh floor's Arizona Simulation Technology & Innovation Center (ASTECH) and eighth floor's 35 exam room Interprofessional Clinical & Professional Skills (ICaPS) Center. I chaired the search committees that culminated in the hiring of four program

directors for the physician assistant (PA), midwife (MW), physical therapy (PT) and genetic counselor programs. In June 2023 the Arizona Board of Regents (ABOR) approved a new college – the College of Health Sciences – to house these programs.

As Senior Advisor and previous PI for the Arizona Area Health Education Centers (AzaAHEC) Program established in 1984, I work to sustain and expand community-based IPE via **Arizona's six AHEC Regional Centers**: in southern Arizona, **SAAHEC** is housed in El Rio Health, a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) system serving Tucson and Pima County across 14 sites; in western Arizona (**WAHEC**) whose parent organization is the Regional Center for Border Health based in Somerton and San Luis, AZ in Yuma County on the US-Mexico border with multiple independent Rural Health Clinics (RHCs) and mobile unit outreach into La Paz and Mohave counties that border California; in eastern Arizona serving Gila, Graham and Greenlee counties by the Center for Excellence in Rural Education (**CERE**) housed in the MHA Foundation in Payson; the Colorado Plateau Center for Health Professions (**CPCHP**) in Flagstaff, AZ by North Country HealthCare, an FQHC system serving five counties; in central Arizona based in Phoenix (**CAAHEC**) housed in the Arizona Alliance for Community Health Centers (AACHC), the Primary Care Association for the State of Arizona, with its 26 Community Health Center system members who provide primary care in 185 FQHC sites across Arizona; and the Arizona Indian Health (**AIH-AHEC**) Regional Center in Flagstaff, AZ initiated in September, 2023.

In May 2023 the legislature passed and the governor signed a bill (SB 1727) appropriating \$5,000,000 to the AzaAHEC Program to expand existing and create new primary care residencies (graduate medical education or GME) in Arizona's rural and underserved areas.

AzaAHEC administers the Rural Health Professions Programs (RHPP) with seven Arizona Board of Regents (ABOR) Colleges at Arizona State University (ASU), Northern Arizona University (NAU), and U of A Colleges of Nursing, Medicine (Phoenix and Tucson), R. Ken Coit College of Pharmacy, and the Mel & Enid Zuckerman College of Public Health (MEZCOPH). The AzaAHEC Program operates an AHEC Scholars Program with the six AzaAHEC Regional Centers and nine RHPPs.

After graduating from the U of A College of Medicine Tucson (COM-T) in 1984, I did a year of Internal Medicine Internship at St. Joseph's Hospital in Phoenix. I completed my Family Medicine residency at the University of New Mexico (UNM) in 1987, then worked for 25 years as faculty in the UNM Department of Family and Community Medicine. In 2018, I received the Leonard Napolitano PhD, UNM COM Alumni Award.

In 2012, I returned to the U of A as a tenured professor in the MEZCOPH Community, Environment & Policy (CEP) Division, with joint academic appointments in the COM-T Department of Family & Community Medicine and the College of Nursing. I served four years as CEP Chair (2015-18), two years as Division Director (2014-15), and three years as Public Health Policy & Management Section Chair (2012-14). In 2019, I was honored with the COM-T Alumnus of the Year.

Since 2013, I have been the Walter H. Pearce Endowed Chair and Director of the Arizona Center for Rural Health (AzCRH). The AzCRH mission is to improve the health and wellness of Arizona's rural and vulnerable populations. Our faculty, staff and students work with Arizona's rural health providers and staff in the state's 17 Critical Access Hospitals, (CAHs) 55 Rural Health Clinics (RHCs) of which 32 are CAH-affiliated, 26 Community Health Center grantees and their 175 FQHC clinical sites in the state, 16 Indian Health Service and 28 Tribal-operated

(Public Law 93-638 Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act) clinics and hospitals.

I have been principal investigator (PI) of state, federal, private foundation and grant awards of over \$100 million (M) over my 37-year academic career: \$48.5M over 25 years as faculty at the University of New Mexico, \$49.6M over 12 years as a University of Arizona professor, and an additional \$4.4M awarded for the next five fiscal years 2025-2029 for our HRSA Medicare Rural Hospital Flexibility (Flex) Program and the Flex EMS Supplement.

I have served as PI of two state and federally designated and funded grant programs - the Arizona State Office of Rural Health (AzSORH), funded by the State of Arizona and the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) and the Arizona Area Health Education Center (AHEC) Program funded by HRSA and the State of Arizona via state lottery dollar formula. I am also PI for the HRSA Rural Hospital Flexibility Program (Flex) and Flex EMS Supplement.

In June of 2021, I received HRSA Notice of Award (NoA) for a \$4.47 five-year competing continuation of our Arizona State Office of Rural Health – the State of Arizona – and Federal Office of Rural Health Policy HRSA designated and funded SORH. Every state has a SORH; Arizona is one of ten states where the SORH is outside of a state health agency.

In August of 2022, I received the five-year competing continuation NoA for the AzaHEC Program. I now serve as the AzaHEC Program's Senior Advisor in my role as UAHS AVP. Leila Barraza JD, MPH is now the AzaHEC Program PI.

UAHS is collaborating with the University of New Mexico (UNM) on a \$10M/yr seven-year NIH Clinical & Translational Science Award (CTSA) submitted in May 2024. If awarded, I will serve as a co-lead for the Element C component modules on CTS workforce development and community engagement. UNM has been awarded three NIH CTSA awards over the last 15 years and is collaborating with UAHS for this 7-year cycle.

In June 2021 the Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS) received a Centers for Disease Control & Prevention (CDC) COVID-19 Disparities grant award. I served as PI for that \$8M, three-year CDC-ADHS-AzCRH Interagency Services Agreement (ISA) subaward through June 2023. As reported in the March 4, 2022 MMWR, urban vaccination coverage was higher in urban counties than in rural counties in every state except Arizona. The collaboration with the ADHS, county health departments, rural and critical access hospitals, FQHCs, IHS and Tribal-run clinics and hospitals, the Center for Rural Health and the AzaHEC Program helped advance rural vaccination coverage in Arizona.

My first HRSA grant in 1990 explored how to train and retain family physicians in rural and urban underserved areas, culminating in accreditation of three new "1+2" New Mexico Family Medicine graduate medical education (GME) residency programs where the second and third years are spent in community settings outside the academic metropolitan teaching hospital.

By augmenting urban training with community-based rural experiences, the retention of resident graduates practicing in the state increased from 25% to 50-75% per year. Half of these family medicine residency graduates ended up working in federally designated health professional shortage areas, medically underserved areas or with medically underserved populations (HPSA/MUA/P). We duplicated that success in NM's first dental residency training program.

These were the models for the Affordable Care Act's Teaching Health Centers provisions described below. In the 2023 Arizona legislative session, I provided data and analysis about the low number of residency slots, graduate medical education (GME), to inform legislative deliberations about a bill intended to expand the number of rural, community based primary care

residency programs in Arizona. The policy brief can be found at:

In 2007-08 I received immersion training in applied health policy in D.C. during an approved sabbatical as a Robert Wood Johnson (RWJ) Health Policy Fellow working for U.S. Senator Jeff Bingaman (D-NM). I researched and drafted health workforce provisions introduced in the Senate in 2007 and included in Title V of the Affordable Care Act (ACA) enacted in 2010.

I applied health policy skills as president of the New Mexico Medical Society (NMMS) by drafting medical homes legislation (HB 710, Rep. Picraux) for NM's Medicaid program (about 450,000 enrollees at the time) and a health workforce data collection bill enacted into NM state statute and collaborated to draft, pass and implement a rural health workforce tax credit.

Appointed by Governor Martinez (R-NM) as Director, NM Office of Health Care Reform in 2011-12, I established their state health insurance marketplace by writing, submitting and receiving Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) Center for Consumer Information and Insurance Oversight (CCIIO) funding of \$34.3 million for the state - engaging advocates, insurers, providers, and consumers in the process. NM's ACA marketplace (BeWellnm) now has over 70,000 enrollees in 2025; NM Medicaid grew from pre-ACA of 450,000 enrolled to 750,000 in 2025.

At U of A, I use data to inform policy at the institutional, local, state and federal levels. Since returning to U of A in 2012, I have chaired 48 statewide conferences, given over 280 invited presentations, and been interviewed, published, and aired for 469 print, radio, television, and social media venues.

In 2015, I provided expert testimony on Rural Health Care Disparities Created by Medicare Regulations and Payment to the U.S. House of Representatives, Committee on Ways and Means, Subcommittee on Health in D.C.

I provided expertise and technical assistance to states on health reform through the National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL) Capitol Forum and the National Governors Association's (NGA's) Expert Roundtables and Policy Academies on rural health.

I was appointed by the Arizona House Speaker to the Ad Hoc Committee on Health Care Workforce in 2017. I gave expert testimony on bills enacted in 2018: HB 2197 creating a health workforce database; HB 2324 Community Health Worker voluntary certification; SB 1377 Dental Therapist.

Health Care Reform – Governor Susana Martinez appointed me Director, New Mexico Office of Health Care Reform in August of 2011. The priorities of the Office were:

- a. ***New Mexico Health Insurance Exchange (now BeWellnm)*** to provide consumer choices for high quality care. I wrote then submitted the level one establishment proposal on 09/29/2011 and received CMS notice of award for \$34,279,483 on 11/29/2011. In 2024, BeWellnm enrollment is more than 53,000.
- b. ***Medicaid Modernization*** to tailor services to meet the needs of NM's vulnerable populations; reward health care outcomes (e.g., health homes); increase administrative efficiency (create a single, manageable waiver). In 2024, NM's Medicaid and CHIP enrollment is nearly 800,000 covering 38% of NM's 2.1 million population.
- c. ***Health Workforce*** to collaborate with stakeholders, education and delivery systems to improve access to quality health care, where it is needed.
- d. ***Control Cost Growth*** to implement payment and delivery reform pilots and programs that measurably promote coordination and integration of care.

Health Workforce: Interprofessional, Community-Based Service Learning Models

The U.S. health professions training pathways begin and often end in more prosperous and adequately staffed urban areas, leaving underserved inner city and rural areas, the elderly and other vulnerable populations without access to high quality, affordable health care. By creating interprofessional training in areas of need – such as in federally qualified health centers, rural health clinics, critical access hospitals, Indian Health Service and Tribal-operated (P.L. 638 Indian Self-Determination) clinics and hospitals - more health professionals are trained and practice where they are most needed. By identifying and preparing students from these areas, we can help assure that our health workforce meets the needs of communities in the state.

Working as an RWJ Health Policy Fellow for US Senator Jeff Bingaman (D-NM, retired after five terms in 2013), I researched and drafted provisions for a comprehensive health workforce bill introduced in the 111th Congress - S.790 “The Health Access and Health Professions Supply Act of 2009.” The S.790 health workforce provisions were later included in H.R. 3590 the “Patient Protection and Affordable Health Care Act” enacted in March 2010:

- a) Teaching Health Centers – THC’s (ACA Title V, Sec. 5508), \$230 million appropriated for 2011-15. THC’s were reauthorized for 2015-17, in 2018, 2020-21 and in 2023-2024.
- b) Sec. 5102 State Health Care Workforce Development Grants and Sec. 5103 Health Care Workforce Assessment, Status: implemented in 2010.

New Mexico was 49th of 50 states in per capita dentists. I helped recruit dental faculty in partnership with the UNM Department of Surgery. With seed funding from the Kellogg Foundation (Health Commons) grant I was PI on, we created a dental residency program in 2004. Almost two-thirds of the dental residency graduates remained in NM to practice, and half were underrepresented minorities. In 2008-09, I served on an Institute of Medicine (now the National Academies of Science) planning committee for an oral health workforce meeting. In the 2018 Arizona legislative session I provided expert testimony on the state’s oral health workforce.

I use data to inform policies at the state and federal levels to train, recruit and retain health professionals in rural and underserved urban areas. I testified at the state legislature about NM’s health workforce shortages and recommended programs to address them, resulting in a recurring appropriation to create the UNM Locum Tenens (LT) academic primary care practice relief program which I directed from 1995-2007. I founded UNM’s Specialty Extension Services (SES) Program in 1998 and served as director of both programs through 2007. That year the LT/SES Programs provided > 700 days of NM practice relief coverage per month. During my time as LT/SES Program director, 250 residency (GME) graduates were working in NM practices where they had provided LT/SES coverage during their training. Of the 500 residents that participated in the LT/SES Programs - half continued to practice in NM after graduation.

The academic practice relief model and resident training in rural community-based venues, received state, national and international recognition for improving the geographic distribution of health services to areas of need. I worked with New Mexico’s Health Policy Commission, NM Department of Health, and the Medical, Dental and Nursing Boards to create data tools to inform public policy and improve access to care. A physician workforce survey was developed, administered, analyzed and the results disseminated in 2001 and again in 2006. The survey was incorporated into the physician electronic licensing and re-licensing process in 2010.

To assure data could be generated for nursing, dental, physicians and other licensed clinical providers through state licensing boards, I worked with state legislators to draft SB 14, the “Health Care Workforce Data Collection, Analysis and Policy Act of 2011” (Sen. Feldman). Licensed health workforce data is used for federal designations and scoring of Health Professions Shortage Areas (HPSAs).

Thirty-eight federal programs, including the National Health Service Corps scholarship and loan repayment programs, use HPSA scoring to allocate funds. In 2018, HB 2197 (Rep. Carter) a health workforce data bill, was enacted in Arizona, and in 2019, SB 1096 (Sen. Carter) was enacted. I was appointed to the Health Care Professional Workforce Data Repository Advisory Committee in 2019 to have the statute specified licensing boards collect health workforce data at the time of licensing and renewal and house the data in the Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS). Data collection, using HRSA recommended minimum data sets, began in 2021. The data has been used to inform legislative deliberations that culminated in recurring appropriations to expand the College of Medicine Phoenix class size, create a Primary Care Physician Scholarship Program (a year-for-year tuition scholarship in exchange for working in an Arizona Health Professional Shortage Area (HPSA) site after completing a primary care residency), expanded state Medicaid GME to allow FQHCs to be graduate medical education (GME) training sites and create a 'Tribal AHEC' Regional Center.

Health Commons – Community-Based, Patient-Centered Medical Homes - New Mexico and Arizona are vast, rural states (fifth and sixth in land area respectively), sharing more than 500 miles of border with Mexico, having 23 and 22 federally recognized tribes respectively, and having many federally designated HPSA/MUA/P. Intractable health problems across economic and ethnic groups, poor access to care, vulnerability to environmental disasters, acute and chronic diseases and the uninsured - have social determinants. The Health Commons was developed by the UNM Department of Family & Community Medicine with safety net collaborators. It linked medical, dental, care management, behavioral & social services in interprofessional, community-based, patient-centered primary care homes.

I was principal investigator (PI) for the \$4.7 million W.K. Kellogg Foundation's Community Voices Healthcare for the Underserved initiative from 1998-2007. Interventions reconfigured the health system to respond to individual, provider and community needs including the UNM Care Plan that created a primary care home (Health Commons) for 15,000 Bernalillo County uninsured individuals. Findings were published in *Academic Medicine* (2000), the *American Journal of Public Health* (2002), and the *Annals of Family Medicine* (2006).

These models framed the insurance and delivery system reforms necessary to create public-private partnerships to cover 40,000 of the state's working poor through the State Coverage Insurance program. The models proved invaluable in reducing NM's uninsured by creating NM's state-based health insurance exchange (BeWellnm), catalyzed by the \$34.3 million CMS establishment grant that I wrote and submitted in 2012. In 2025, more than 70,000 New Mexicans are BeWellnm enrollees. By expanding Medicaid as allowed by the ACA, NM grew from 450,000 enrollees pre-ACA in its Medicaid program to 750,000 in 2025. Covering the uninsured reduces the disproportionate charity care burden in rural hospitals and clinics.

My current work informs legislative, regulatory and program policy to increase health insurance coverage, reduce the uninsured, narrow health disparities and assure a well-trained and distributed health workforce to meet the health needs of all Arizonans.

These principles are reflected in my core grant portfolio below, that combined with Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS) interagency agreements (ISAs), federal grants, state and other funding exceeded \$12 million awarded for fiscal year 2023-24.

Established in 1984, the AzAHEC mission is to enhance access to quality health care, particularly primary and preventive care, by improving the supply and distribution of health care professionals through academic community partnerships in rural and medically underserved areas. The AzAHEC Program office is in Tucson. The six AHEC Regional Centers are: the American Indian Health AIH-AHEC Regional Center (Flagstaff); CAAHEC (Phoenix); CERE (Payson), CPCHP (Flagstaff), SAAHEC (Tucson), WAHEC (Somerton). The AzAHEC Program received its five-year competing continuation award in August 2022 through 2027. By state statute AzAHEC receives \$4.5 to \$5 million per year through a state lottery funding formula that covers the required non-federal (state) match for the federal HRSA support. Since 10/1/23 I now serve as the AzAHEC Program Senior Advisor in my role as Associate Vice President for Rural Health Outreach Workforce Development Initiatives and previously served as Principal Investigator from 7/1/20-9/30/23. Leila Barraza JD, MPH became PI effective 10/1/23.

Medicare Rural Hospital Flexibility Program (AzFlex) - since 1999, AzFlex has provided technical assistance, training and information resources for Arizona's 17 Critical Access Hospitals, 55 Rural Health Clinics, and a statewide network of health providers. It is now in year five of a five-year federal funding cycle. HRSA funded the five-year competing continuation proposal for 9/1/24 through 8/31/29.

2022-24 included an additional Flex EMS Supplement of \$300,000/yr X 2 years. Josh Gaither, MD in the U of A Department of Emergency Medicine served as PI. HRSA awarded a five-year competing continuation Flex Supplement for 9/1/24 to 8/31/25.

State Office of Rural Health (SORH) - The goal is to assist States in strengthening rural health care delivery systems by maintaining a focal point for rural health in each state. Continuously funded since 1990, the program requires a State / Fed 3:1 match, now in Year 4 of a 5-year cycle.

Junior Faculty Mentoring, Support and Promotion - over the last five years, I moved more than \$10 million in grant funding that I had served as PI on to less experienced faculty including Mona Arora, Leila Barraza, Ben Brady, Josh Gaither, Bryna Koch, Bridget Murphy, Brianna Rooney and Marc Verhougstraete. Two (Barraza, Verhougstraete) were promoted from assistant to tenured associate professors over this period; four (Arora, Koch, Murphy, Rooney) were hired as career track assistant professors of research in the Mel & Enid Zuckerman College of Public Health. In 2025 Leila Barraza JD, MPH is up for promotion from tenured associate professor to tenured full professor.
